

NOVEMBER HOST & POND PROFILE Inland Koi / Joe & Peter Cao ~ Riverside

Have you ever had a hobby you loved so dearly and were able to do so well that you decided to turn it into a professional business?

If so, come meet Joe Cao at Inland Koi this month during our January General Meeting. His older brother, Peter, says, "Joe always had <u>so</u> many hobbies—turtles, reptiles, plants, birds, spiders, comic books and cards—but mostly fish." Of all the hobbies, fish continued to be his biggest love and Joe started the business at his Riverside home in 2002. He was inspired by a friend who had fish in a tank, and Joe built one just like it. He feels a close connection to koi because he can pet and teach them. He says each koi has its own personality and you soon find out which trait develops. One of the favorite places Joe and brother Peter buy koi is in the city of Niigata, Japan, and will go so they can personally choose which koi to bring home.

The Cao family, father, mother and four boys, came from Vietnam, arriving in the U.S. around 1985. They settled in Amarillo, Texas, first, but a year later moved here to Riverside and settled in an uncle's house. All six in the family jubilantly celebrated receiving their United States citizenship in 1989.

The four brothers all went to school here and graduated with honors. They've each branched out a little, with Peter now living in Orange County, lovingly married to Van; they have 6½-year-old twin boys. Peter has suffered from the economy recently by being laid off work. He has a degree in Computer Science, but work is scarce so he has lined up with Joe's interest in koi and is helping full-time at Inland Koi.

Their father and mother live with Joe and take care of the plants, cooking and housekeeping. They keep an eye on this two quarantine tanks and are maintaining the 10,000-gallon pond— originally a swimming pool—that Joe still uses to grow his koi out more.

Joe is single, available, and the youngest of the four Cao boys. He follows his love of fish and the sound of moving water because it relaxes him. Joe is going to school part-time to try to finish his AA degree, and no matter how cramped or stressful his time is, he <u>never</u> gives up what interests him.

In June, 2009, the City of Riverside gave Inland Koi one month to move out of the residential area, so they have been under a lot of stress. But to shop here, the customers would never know it. Joe and Peter are very professional, courteous and have great customer (and friend) skills.

The business is now located in a 2,500-sq.ft. building with an office, a lobby, and a shop. Joe moved all the tanks he had at the house into the shop along with two new 3,400-gallon pools (the largest ponds) and some 400-gallon show tanks (smallest ponds). These tanks run 24/7, primarily with Sequence Pumps and Wave Pumps. The main problems with the move were the loss of good bacterial elements every pond acquires over time, and having to change to an inside environment. Without sun, koi loose the brilliant colors. Their fish began to fade, so Joe and Peter are currently installing lighting over the tanks to simulate sunlight. They've also incorporated a lot of beautiful, natural plants and greenery around the shop.

Inland Koi recently added teak outdoor furniture to

their inventory, along with koi food and health products, and a small amount of pond equipment. They are very experienced in koi health, so if you have questions, they will help in any way they can!

Joe says the best thing about being in the koi business is that he gets to do (work in) his favorite hobby ALL the time!

Joe and Peter are donating hand-painted koi magnets from Japan to our monthly raffle as well as offering a 25% discount on all fish sold to <u>IKS members</u> during this meeting. A 10% discount on any supplies bought by members will also apply on this day.

There will be plenty of parking and space for our meeting. You might want to bring an umbrella to shield you from sun or rain, depending on the weather, because we probably will gather in the back parking lot. Dress accordingly, and please bring your delicious addition to share in the potluck. Members are always encouraged to donate raffle prizes and don't forget to get a free ticket at the registration table for each prize donated. I'll see you there!

omething to think about

Time to get back on the old treadmill! Hope the holidays were beautiful for you. Now is the time to prepare your pond for the abbreviated winter—in Florida, Texas and South California, we can stop feeding our fish for a month, even though the water temperatures are still above 55F. That will give the fish a chance to reabsorb eggs, not to become egg-bound if they did not drop them last summer. The month rest is healthful to the fish. It's time to check our pond equipment, too. If you buy the UV bulbs now, you will have them when needed. If you do the little things you didn't have time for in summer, the fish will thank you. Autumn Winter Prep isn't just for northern ponds and leaves. It contains good bacteria to work in colder water. If you have a vegetable filter (even the Tropical Lilies!) it will help biodegrade the dead leaves and stems before they begin to sprout again. "A clean pond is next to Godliness..." or something like that. When you resume feeding, feed the lower protein, Legacy Cold Weather Wheat Germ food. In spring, the fish will put all their energy and reserves into reproduction. Unless you want a big spawn, feed lightly until after that's all over. Once they have spawned, it's time to pile on the protein! If your pond water remains above 45F in your area, you can continue adding PL all year!



IKS GENERAL MEETING ~ SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 22, 2009

This was a meeting not to be missed. The day was a little chilly, but clear and sunny. The setting was beautiful. The house was beautiful. The pond and the fish...very nice fish! There were 78 people at the meeting, and it seemed like everyone brought food. The hosts provided the turkey breast, and the members provided all the rest. After all of us ate as much as we could, Steve talked about the pond and the building process.

Steve and Lily Rhodes live in the Temecula hills in the middle of an avocado orchard. Steve and Lily have done most if not all of the hardscape and landscape work themselves. There was no access for any heavy equipment, so they jackhammered their pond out of the granite bedrock. It took them a year to do it, six inches at a time, and Lily jackhammered also. My hat is off to her! Steve said she was really good at it, but he had to help her get the hammer up and down the ladder. Oh, and the ladder... it got tougher to go up and down the ladder with the jackhammer as the pond got deeper. That's determination.

Did you notice the show screening in the family room? Steve installed a Lurex under-water camera—great for low-light applications—with a feed to the house. Besides being entertaining it has been useful: he was able to detect otherwise unseen belly tumors on his koi. There is a quarantine tank in the garage for new or sick fish.


The guest speaker was Shawn McHenry from Mystic Koi. He was home just three weeks from Japan and spoke poignantly about being in Niigata during the fifth-year anniversary festival of the huge earthquake that destroyed many breeders' koi ponds and killed a number of people. That was Oct. 25, 2004, and Shawn was in the middle of it, trapped in Niigata where he had visited breeders. He told of having to walk out seven miles to escape the area, and of the destroyed golf course that has been turned into a memorial park. It was filled with hundreds of special candles set out to read "If you can read this, Niigata is smiling" (translated). The meaning was clear: We're okay; we're moving on. The Japanese have erected a memorial both to the victims of the earthquake and to the survivors. Some of the breeders were wiped out, but their customers helped them to reconstruct their breeding stock from fish that were purchased prior to the quake. Each koi represents a breeder, and each breeder has his own story. So many of them breed only one variety and lost their parent stock in the quake; for some recovery has meant drastic change.

Shawn explained that pairing one male and one female may yield 250-300,000 babies, which will be cut by up to 80% in the first couple of weeks. A few weeks later that will be trimmed to 20,000, and then reduced to only 2000, most culled for poor color development. A breeder can raise up, feed and care for 2000, keeping only 100-200 to grow out for the next season. At one farm there were only five 3-year-olds left from 100 tosai. Shawn talked of a chagoi breeder whose day started at 3AM and ended at 8PM; he's 33 years old with already silvered hair. He has local 'grannies' picked up to do his feeding; it would take one man all day to feed the fish twice, and nothing else would get done.

Shawn will be in Niigata again in late January for the All Japan Show and indicated this would be a good trip to make. Winter is one of the best times to visit breeders in Japan because they are not so busy then. He talked to us his trips to Japan, getting to know and establishing relationships with the dealers and breeders; he had to cultivate these over a period of years. The breeders work to make the dealers successful, too; one will even acclimate his fish to Mystic Koi's water temperature before shipping them. Strong relationships make everything work out, and every American dealer who goes to Japan has to build that rapport. It takes time to develop an atmosphere of trust and respect. This may be because of cultural and language differences, but the relationship between supplier and customer is also very important for us. All of us need to build a relationship with the people who supply our hobby. We need to have confidence that we are getting quality, disease-free Koi, and quality food and equipment.

Koi keeping is about fish, but it is also about people. We love the fish, but our success as koi keepers is dependent on our skills, knowledge, and plain hard work. We get help and information from each other. Also, we have fun getting to know each other. The meeting was informative and just plain fun. Come join us at the next meeting! ~ Zuma Ross, IKS Secretary



IS IT TIME TO FEED YET?

Be conservative about beginning to feed. Once the temperature stabilizes for several days, at 55° or higher, you can begin feeding very lightly once or twice a week, all the time watching for when the next cold front will show up and the cycle repeats. If in doubt, do not feed. I would also recommend not feeding if it appears another strong cold front is due within the next 72 hours. If you are going out of town do not have your fish fed. It is better not to feed at all, than to overfeed. In general, most years I do not feed my koi at all for six to eight weeks during the winter.


This is not usually a continuous fast but one that lasts a week or two, interrupted by one or two light feedings, followed by another week or two of fasting, as the cold fronts march through our area. When I say *feed lightly*, I mean only 2-3 pellets per small- to medium-sized koi once or twice a week. It is worth repeating: *It is better to underfeed or not feed at all than to overfeed*.

Continue to watch your fish carefully for any that do not swim or act like the other fish. On very cold days they will all move slowly or even be inactive, but they should all act similarly. Watch carefully any fish that swims funny or sits on the bottom when others are starting to swim around.

Watch for cuts or sores that might develop. Injuries will not heal well in cold water and when we get a few days of warmer temperatures the bad bugs can wake up and cause big problems. If you test and find ammonia or nitrite present, do a major water change (20%-40%) and stop feeding.

If the signs and symptoms point to parasites, catch and scrape a few of your koi and look at the sample with a microscope. IKS has several microscopes available in our inventory; if you need to use one, call Tom Ross or Jack Marrin (phone numbers on page 2). If parasites are discovered, use appropriate treatment for the current water temperature in your pond.

- Control of green water and string algae
- Control of fish parasites
- Quarantine of new (or returning) fish for viruses, parasites, and bacteria
- Rapid repair of any ulcers, mouth rot, fin rot
- Protection from the hazards of winter weather
- Back-up power system of some kind
- Reasonable stocking density and pond depth.


