

February IKS Newsletter:

orothy and I didn't get home from our trip to Peru until 2 AM Monday morning, so we didn't get to attend the January meeting. I want

to thank IKS Vice President, **Ed Kushner**, for chairing the

meeting, which was different than normal as it was held in a restaurant with no potluck meal because of the possibility of bad weather.

I was thinking about what members would be thinking about this time of the year with regard to koi. When spring arrives and we are motivated to be outside, what improvements are we going to make to our ponds, or are we going to build a new one? What comes to mind is wanting a low maintenance, state-of-the-art pond.

The Motto should be:" Work Your Pond - Don't Let it Work You."
Traditionally during pond season, one must spend an hour or so each weekend maintaining the pond, otherwise the pump gets clogged and the waterfall stops running. Anyone who "never has cleaned the pond" is probably the proud owner of a swamp. Those of us who have had a pond for a few years want our "weekend life" back and would opt for a maintenance-free pond solution.

The real problem is there are no truly maintenance-free pond systems. The closest would be designing a pond with this in mind.

People in the water garden industry, especially those who have been around for awhile, have a history of downplaying or totally rejecting the effectiveness of a low maintenance pond because their "tried and true" ponds from the past are all they know.

If your weekends are filled with pond "to-dos" and you would rather spend precious time relaxing and enjoying the pond, think about your design. Remember, you are the one who will have to maintain your pond. Here are some things to consider:

Location? Where Do I Place the Pond: Don't place it in the sun simply because a book says to put it there.

In the Sun: Water lilies need five hours to bloom, but keep in mind that algae bloom can also create a visual problem enjoying the koi.

In the Shade: Most plants don't bloom very well in the shade but they keep the pond cool. Leaves can be a problem unless you install a skimmer or netting over the pond. Herons can't see your koi under the canopy of trees.

Runoff Areas: Avoid placing the pond in areas where water runs off after a heavy rain. Runoff can get between the pond wall and a liner. Also consider any runoff from the neighbors' weed killer.

How Low, or What Depth to Go: Three feet plus, so fish have a place to go when critters are around.

Is Bigger Better: Yes! Ask anyone who has a pond if they would have made it bigger if they had it to do over again.

What Style: Anything you like as long as there are bottom drains, no dead spots in the water circulation, and no rocks on the bottom to gather koi excrement.

Dorothy and I are looking forward to his month's meeting in Cherry Valley and hopefully we will see you there.

FEBRUARY HOSTS & POND PROFILE Edward-Dean Museum & Gardens ~ Cherry Valley

THE EDWARD-DEAN MUSEUM AND GARDENS in Cherry Valley is hosting the Inland Koi Society's February meeting in the Kay Ceniceros Cultural Arts Center.

A LITTLE HISTORY: The Edward-Dean Museum & Gardens is housed in a cultural complex on the edge of a small town on the edge of the Los Angeles Metropolitan area, a surprisingly rural setting for a cultural center. The museum began as the private collections of two fine arts dealers, J. Edward Eberle and Dean W. Stout. Keeping the best pieces for themselves, by the 1950s they had gathered an impressive collection. They purchased a cluster of buildings in Cherry Valley, a town a little east of Redlands, and established a museum. The grounds include a classical garden.

In 1964, they donated the museum and property to Riverside County. Additional pieces have been added to make this a comprehensive and unique museum. The art, furniture, and decorative arts are not the only beautiful objects in the house.

SOME MUSEUM FEATURES: Rooms of interest in the Gallery:

- >The Pine Room sets a comfortable home-like atmosphere, found throughout the galleries, yet is itself a work of art. The Pine Room was originally in the State Bedroom of Cassiobury Park, home to the Earls of Essex. William Randolph Hearst had purchased the paneling to install it in Marion Davies' home, and when that house was scheduled to be demolished, J. Edward Eberle quickly bought the paneling to install in the new museum, then still under construction.
- >The Blue Room has a particularly intimate feeling. Originally Mr. Eberle's personal living room, when the museum was built, the room was transported and reinstalled as part of the permanent galleries.
- >The Picture Gallery includes paintings and water colors hung in the style of a European Museum. A few noted English watercolorists include Paul Sandby, whose work was produced in the late 1700's, yet seems closely related to the 19th century Impressionist style. You will notice furniture, marble statues, and many other nested artifacts of previous centuries in this room.
- >The Oriental Room shows beautiful Asian pieces, textiles and garments; cultural articles from China such as shoes for bound feet and a jade neck rest; and other oriental imports. There are oriental Chippendale chairs and twelve panels relative to the experiences of the Chinese artist's journey through the Diamond Mountains of Korea.
- >The Stairwell Case contains a variety of articles, copies of books, an amulet, a silver cross, figures of Madonna and the saints, 10th century triptych of Byzantine icons, and several portraits of famous people.
- >The Library was an essential feature of the English gentleman's 18th century home. This library contains about 3,000 books and is used by scholars, students, volunteers and staff for fine research of valuable information.

THE BEAUTIFULLY LANDSCAPED GROUNDS include a 10,000-gallon concrete pond with koi. The pond has no filtration, just continuous fresh water coming in with an over-flow draining out into the landscape. There is a circle planter with a flowing fountain

in the front drive which was added about four years ago. The rose gardens and terraces were added two years ago through donations and a contractor.

The Museum has several temporary exhibits annually featuring local, national and international displays of decorative arts from past and present artists and collectors. There are many other exciting events happening throughout the year, including a free concert series. Check the schedule at www.edward-deanmuseum.org. If you wish to have a guided tour on Sunday February 27th, please call to schedule and reserve a time PRIOR to our 2:00 pm IKS meeting. Admission to the museum is \$5 and hours are Friday, Saturday, and Sunday from 10 am to 5 pm.

This wonderful meeting will be inside again this month, with tables and chairs available, so you do <u>not</u> need to bring your chairs unless you'd like to sit outside by the pond.


There is a kitchen attached to the area where we will be gathering, so setting up will be easy. Please be sure to donate to the potluck and remember to take your dishes home at the end.

- ●Turn LEFT through the gate and continue going on the left hand side at the "Y" in the road to the back parking lot. You'll see the Koi pond down the small hill on the right and a large building to the left of the pond. Work your way down the road, or path, to the building.





A small update of the total blood donations made last year in the name of the Inland Koi Society. The donation period was between February 2, 2010 to December 29, 2010 with the total donations amounting to 31 units. There has been 3 donations made so far this year!

It has been one year now that the Inland Koi Society has become a donor club for LifeStream. If you recall, LifeStream is the name for The Blood Bank of San Bernardino and Riverside Counties.

Board Member, Bob Henry instigated putting in place the IKS donor club, and for making the first two donations in our name. Bob donates regular as clockwork, and last year was honored by LifeStream at its annual recognition dinner.

LifeStream is a private, non-profit comprehensive blood center founded in 1951 by the medical societies of the two counties for the purpose of maintaining an adequate and safe blood supply.

LifeStream operates five donor centers, and conducts community blood drives daily, to receive the 500 donations needed every day to support the current needs of patients, including surgery and trauma cases, transplant recipients, premature infants and cancer patients.

Whole blood is not the only type of collection LifeStream handles. There are automated collections of necessary blood component such as platelets, plasma and red blood cells. Since 1951, more than 2.8 million blood and blood component donations have been received. They have also recruited and registered over 25,000 blood marrow donors for the National Marrow Donor Program.

Are YOU a donor yet? There is no greater way to give of yourself than to donate blood. And remember... when donating at the LifeStream Blood Center, make your donations to the Inland Koi Society. This will give our club the credit and will make you feel good that you have helped someone in need. Plus, if you ever need a transfusion, you will get the credit of our club's donation

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

Word quickly went out via phone and email and on that first day 24 volunteers showed up. In the subsequent days and weeks, volunteers joined Ben Plonski, his family, friends and employees in restoring order. Spindola, Whalen, Finnegan, Elliott, Chandler, Wright, Hernandez, Stumpf, Freihof, Corlett, Svelan, Pierce, Chapman, Pluth: These families we recall (hopefully we haven't left others out).

Male and female, rain or shine, young and old, shoveling it up, carrying it out, hosing it off, carrying it back in, washing filthy clothing, providing hot meals, pitching in, getting it done: This was how we ate the elephant – one bite at a time.

We not only labored in the muddy trenches, we raised badly needed cash to help keep things running. 
