MARCH POND & HOST PROFILE

Nick Deggy Milfeld have invited IKS members to hold the March General Meeting in their exquisite garden. Many of us have visited the Milfelds' garden and pond before: it has been on two IKS Pond Tours and on the Riverside Flower Show Garden Tour. It has seen two weddings, three receptions, a Women's Ministry Luncheon & Fashion Show, fifteen years of Pathway Christian Church Easter breakfasts, a fund raiser for Alvord School District, and twice been on the RCRMC Spring Garden Tour. Their yard was featured on a night-light garden tour, written about in the Press Enterprise Newspaper several times, and featured in many other events.

Nick, Peggy, and their three children built two ponds at their last home, and a prerequisite for the 1987 move to Riverside was a property that would support waterfalls (like in a forest). Nick's 'beautiful forest' vision was invisible to three of four landscape architects facing the flat, barren half-acre and the 2-to-1 slope to a block-wall lot line left by the developers. But tons of rearranging, and truckloads of topsoil and amendments later, the digging began and the trees got planted.

The real adventure begins as you enter the backyard where you will find yourself magically transported to a beautiful forest of tall whispering pine, cedar and redwood trees. Nick has always said his woodland yard is the result of his inability to move Milfelds' Azalea Nursery, his wholesale family business, to the mountain environment he would have preferred. Instead, when he and Peggy moved the business and their home to Riverside from Temple City, he stubbornly brought the forest to his back yard, thus also creating a lush microclimate for ferns, azaleas, maples and hydrangea. Recently the garden had a make-over, with trees trimmed and thinned to allow more sunlight to bathe the wealth of various flowers and trees. Be sure to take the trail that reaches into the trees among ferns where you can get a good view of the series of terraced waterfalls cascading down to the Milfelds' spectacular gunite Koi pond and swimming pool. Edging rock and waterfalls were all hand formed of concrete and painted to support an idea of naturalness. The plantings, additions and care are done by Nick and Peggy with lots of love and a pride in gardening, with constant shifts according to weather or wishes.

The 11,000-gallon pond, with waterfalls and an island, is to the left, and a swimming pool, with a spa and waterfall, is to the right. There is a deck in the middle which makes the



pond and pool look like they are joined. Two different filter systems filter the pond. Two bottom drains feed a combination of three vortexes by Patio Ponds, with a ¼ hp Sequence pump and an Aqua UV with 120 watts back to the pond through jets. Two bottom drains and a skimmer feed the second filter

system, driven by two ¼ hp Sequence pumps, first to a pair of pre-filters built by Bob Walters, then to another 120 watt UV light, up to a three-chamber up-flow rock-gravel-silica sand filter to polish the water; then back to the pond via a

waterfall. The systems run 24/7. There's also a 2 hp pump that pulls water from two other bottom drains and goes straight to the giant waterfall, which runs only when there is an audience.

Nick was our longtime club Treasurer, and Peggy, our club secretary, greets you at the sign-in table at each meeting, helps proof the Inland Koi Connection, and has created the IKS Pond Tour booklets



each year. Because of their dedication and constant involvement, both have been elected as an IKS Person of the Year in the past. You couldn't find a better example of unselfish giving and friendship in our club than the two of them.

The Milfeld's have a beautiful swimming pool, 15,000 gallons, 4½ feet deep, with a 2 hp pump for the waterfall. Sorry we're out of season right now and the pool is <u>not fenced</u>, so parents will need to keep an eye on young children.)

No Need to bring chairs this time... the yard will still be set up from an earlier Church Palm Sunday "Easter" breakfast.






THE INLAND KOICONNECTION

FEBRUARY GENERAL MEETING

Finding the Fales' house is just a bit dicey as another #760 is right down the street — albeit on the other side — and more than one car stops there first. Seems the street changes names mid-curve! The wind blows in 49 of our members; most of the locals are here, and a couple of the San Diego contingent who aren't working at the San Diego Koi Show, plus a few of our more distant friends. It is good to see *Morris & Marie Nyquist* of Sun City, *Alan Pollock & Mom* from La Quinta, and *Ed & Sue Vermilyea* of Upland, for we haven't seen any of them for several months. *Lloyd & Joy Rein* drive in from Garden Grove every month, and our new Director, *Randy McGarvey* comes twice a month from Yucaipa. It is a pleasant surprise to meet *Randall Grommet* and *Elizabeth Prince* from Riverside; although they joined us at the 2012 Pond Tour, this is the first time they can attend and pick up their badges. We hope to see more of them in the future.

Leveryone has a preferred month to host a meeting, but **Rob** chose a special day — his 29th (again!?) birthday! Got the family off the hook for throwing a party, too. We thank **Rob & Deanna Fales** and their kids, **Eric & Carrie**, (**Robin** isn't home from college this weekend) for inviting us to the celebration. Others who share the February birthday cake are **Mark Krakower**, **Bob Walters** and **Theo Zoetemelk**, and in absentia, **Laura Pollak** and **Bruce Smith**. Happy, Happy day to all! As for special days, we are told that **Theo & Jeanne Zoetemelk** will celebrate their 48th anniversary on Tuesday; Mac is quick to commiserate with Jeanne!

Before the wind-chill has us hibernating in whatever wraps we have, Mac calls us in for lunch. The Fales have a very nice sun room they emptied to make room for two buffet tables; desserts wait in the dining room, and hot coffee is in the kitchen. One of the surprise treats of the day is a case of *Popcornopolis* mini-cones in four decadent flavors. Yum!

D ob speaks briefly about the development of his split-level backyard

retreat. Not a *last-pond-first* construction, we are visiting the third version. There were 12 koi earlier in the week; today we see 11. The quarantine tank holds Tosai from Larry & Debby Leverett's 2012 spawns; in Rob's pond they are still *skimmer-bait*. At pond's edge is a lovely palegreen-and-pink bog plant — variegated water celery —and Deanna generously shares rooted pieces with *Ginger Cover* and me.

The library of Nicholas Saint- Erne's revised book, Advanced Koi Care for Veterinarians and Professional Koi Keepers, signed by the author. Nick Milfeld gives a short account of Saturday at

the 26th San Diego Koi Show, their largest to date with over 360 koi entered. Our own *Mariano Palpallatoc* is a first-time entrant with some beautiful koi. Nick asks for volunteers to work at the auction on June 1, sends around a sign-up sheet, and has flyers available for us to spread around our towns. *Rey Quirong* invites all to the March meeting: *Mark Whalen* will instruct us on photographing koi in anticipation of our Koi of the Year competition in April.

s **Pete Miles** takes center stage to talk about his favorite koi, the Ogon, in all its variety, he is setting the bar higher, with a three-page fullcolor handout and a written quiz; but remember, he's a teacher... These handouts are becoming a wonderful resource, and I wonder if many of us keep a notebook or folder of all the info we have been given over the years. With no hope of an easel holding a big display board, **Eric Fales** holds it steady against the wind. Pete tells us that Ogon goes by other names, too, but all mean about the same. *Hikarimono* and *Hikari-mujimono* translate "shiny ones" or "light without pattern." **Ogon is a metallic koi** (*shiny, light*) **of one color only** (*without pattern*), most commonly in gold (*Yamabuki*), Hosted by the Fales ~ Corona

then white (*Purachina* in Japan, but *Platinum* in the West) and orange (*Orenji*), but also grey (*Nezu*) and burnished

platinum gold (*Mukashi*), and very rarely a cream color. The variety was created by Sawata Aoki from a gold-striped wild carp he caught in 1921. After 25 years in development, his pure golden "Ogon" was recognized as a distinct variety in 1946. Ogon grow rapidly and mature quickly, and are markedly noticeable in the pond. Look for an unblemished body with perfect scalation; blemishes and scars cannot hide where there is no pattern,



and become more visible as the fish matures. The head must be clear, too; a dirty head detracts from the purity of the Ogon. There are variations to Ogon, including longfin, Doitsu (scaleless), and Gin Rin (with reflective scales). As Mac thanks Pete for his report, he encourages ANY member to offer a report about a favorite koi variety. Call him to volunteer!

R ecurrent pond problems lead to serious questions, so we occasionally seat a panel of club "experts" to field the members' queries and offer solid solutions. This time *Theo*, *Larry*, *Dennis*, *Jack*, *Spike* and *Nick* took the stage, and *Carl Leever* and *Bob Walters* added comments.

Q: How do you get rid of string algae?

A: First, know that a UV won't kill it. Theo and Carl rely on salt; with a 12,000-gallon pond, Theo uses 500# a year (applied in the waterfall so it dissolves slowly) plus 10% water changes every two weeks. Recommended amount of salt is 3# per 100 gallons. To clean it off the waterfall, Larry and Nick use hydrogen peroxide: turn off the falls and let them dry a bit, spray it on and let it fizzle out, then scrape the remains off. It can be labor-intensive, but well worth the effort.

Q: Our filter seems really sluggish and ineffective...what could be wrong?

A: For a type of bead, ribbon, bio balls or bio-blox filter media, Bob says you need to do a complete cleanout of the filter so the media can freely agitate. Filter mats and pads need to be power washed as with heavy spray from a hose.

Q: Is there a problem with feeding all winter?

A: Yes. Spike says a gut enzyme that helps digest food dies at 46°; after that, food will rot in the gut, then pass through to foul the water. (Fish guts are 2° warmer than the water.) Koi go into a semi-hibernation; they fatten up in summer and subsist on algae and body fat when water is too cold. And females that didn't spawn will absorb the eggs... Theo added to watch for *porcupine disease*, a condition that makes scales raise up like quills and indicates the fish is septic.

Q: Our koi have what look like white scales under 1/8". What are they?

A: Spike says maybe carp pox, which come in winter; if they move, fish lice. To treat them, "heat 'em up!" — quarantine at 75 to 80°. Or salt the pond.





Did You Get Started in this Koi Hobby? How

I BUILT MY KOI POND FIRST, THEN BUILT OUR HOUSE AROUND IT


I first saw koi in 1969 at one of the hotels on a vacation in Hawaii. However, it wasn't until we moved to Louisville, back to California in 2002; we left most of the koi behind, Kentucky, in 1988 and created a garden pond that we actually had any koi. Rachel and I decided that we wanted a garden pond, so a pond lady named Tiffany Schofield came over to our house and we worked with her to put in a small 1200-gallon water garden pond. We also found a company in southern Indiana that was selling koi, and purchased five or six and put them into the pond.

Of course, the pond we had was built all wrong by today's standards. For example, it did not have a bottom drain or skimmer. It did have a filter, but it was an in-thepond gravel filter. Five or six koi would've been a good number, but we also had stocked the pond with goldfish as well. We kept them that way for quite a while, then the koi got so big that they were tearing up the plants. I remember coming out to the pond one day and finding my water lily floating roots up! They had actually gotten all of the rocks out of the planter, and pulled the plant out and devoured it. That's when we decided we needed to build a bigger pond and get the koi away from the plants.

The new pond was built to accommodate only koi and was a proper koi pond. It had an out-of-pond filter, bottom drain, skimmer, and no plants at all. It was approximately 4500 gallons. "How did I learn to do it correctly this time around when building a new pond?" The answer is that I joined the AKCA in 1988 and I subscribed to Koi USA, which contained a wealth of information. In order to learn even more, I joined my local koi club — the Greater Louisville Koi and Goldfish Society. I served as president in 1990 and 1991, and was named Koi Person of the Year for the Club in 1991. In 1994, the Greater Louisville Koi Club hosted the AKCA National Seminar and Rachel and I both worked very hard to help make the Seminar a success.

To find quality koi, we had to fly to California

or go to Florida, because when we started there just weren't any quality dealers in our area. If you name a dealer in Southern California, we probably bought koi from them — Toyoma, Eastern, Asahi and lately we have been buying from



Inland Koi here in Riverside (they carry pretty good quality of koi for the money). For several years, I worked at the Louisville Koi show, in charge of water quality, and we showed koi as well. In fact, we were fortunate enough in 1999 to win Grand Champion with a very nice Shiro Utsuri.

When I retired from UPS Airlines, we decided to move but did bring a few with us. We still have one or two in the pond; one of them is a Chagoi. Once back in California, we built our current pond which is 16,000 gallons.

I acquired most of my knowledge on koi from reading *Koi USA* and the rest from trial and error. I learned a lot from buying books on koi from numerous sources, including AKCA, and I have a pretty extensive library on koi and their care. I think the first book I ever bought was the Tetra Encyclopedia of Koi.
