
We'll return to Jack & Norma Marrin's historic Heritage Home in beautiful Redlands this month. If you haven't been there before, you'll be amazed at how they have been slowly developing the whole five acres (wear your walking shoes!). Purchased as a fixer-upper in 1986, the house was surrounded

by waist-high weeds, massive 90-year-old oak trees, and neglected landscaping. They started refurbishing the home and creating the gardens – with a detailed plan to guide them. A garage built for Model T's was falling apart, but the zoning department rejected plans to replace it; Jack left the original walls and built anew garage to enclose them.

Jack & Norma's research, knowledge and creativity shine in the master plan, which surrounds the house with various "theme" gardens. The Roman Garden comprises the whole back yard, with a swimming pool, reflecting pool, columns and life-size marble statues, and two deep 2,500-gallon koi ponds. Made of concrete with waterproof liners, both have bottom drains and flow to sand filters converted to bead filters. Two-speed pumps pull water from the ponds, through filters and UV lights, and back to the ponds. We will probably meet around the pool, with level ground for chairs.

On the southeast side of the home, Norma designed and has worked extensively with a series of colorful raised beds to resemble a French Garden, with multi-level terraces, an elaborate system of raised planter boxes, and a hand-carved marble wellhead. Her small and serene Mary Garden is perfect for times of quiet meditation.

The whole front yard was torn out about ten years ago and a four-foot-wide formal 'stream' was installed, running from the front door to the edge of what Norma and Jack call the front terrace. The grassy terrace is ringed in ARS-awarded roses from family birth years and has been the site of several weddings in the last few years.









At almost street level in the front is the finally finished Italian Garden. Big oak trees were moved to a different area of the property, along with several other trees, to make room for it. We met here in 2010, and the rough grading of this garden was visible; by the 2012 Pond Tour, the colonnade and Haddon-

stone stairs leading down to it were finished. Now, that area is finished, and work has moved to the *Tropical Garden* on the west side of the long serpentine driveway. Future garden plans include a *Japanese Garden* in the lower western area of property, with two large koi ponds cascading down the hill and an authentic Japanese Teahouse, but we wonder if everything on the master plan can ever become a *fait accompli*.

There is so much to see here that you just have to come to this meeting. If you don't usually come to meetings and just read the newsletter, I urge you to try to make this meeting. You can come and just wander through the grounds; you won't be disappointed!

Jack & Norma joined IKS about 1995. Since then, Jack has been President of IKS and an AKCA Rep. They have shown championship koi and have won the Champion of Champions trophy for having the best champion koi in the USA. Norma was the artist for our T-shirts for several years – shirts coveted by koi keepers across the country – and has done many designs for AKCA and KCSD. The all-time favorite design is what we will wear this year for the Pond Tour.

Last year they sold their business to retire: they owned one of the few companies that made – and bottled – smog. Actually, they made and bottled gases, smog being one of them, and shipped them around the world to institutions that needed a type

of pure gas for research and product development. Smog stations used their bottled gas to calibrate smog-testing machines. Our field trips always start in their parking lot, close to the 215 Freeway, and our Board of Directors met around their huge conference table for many years.

When you arrive, there are two places to park. You can enter the driveway from Cajon and <u>park on the left (west) side only;</u> that will leave room for exiting drivers to pass by your vehicle. You may also park on Summit Avenue and enter the back yard








Nick began his pond talk, I wondered how he would condense it this time. I love being reminded of all he's done in this yard in the past 30 years: I can always tell how much fun he's had by how filthy his jeans or shorts are! So...

January'89, after about 32 truckloads of topsoil and amendments yanuary 89, and about 32 uncertainty of the 2:1 slope were worked in and the land was terraced to soften the 2:1 slope to the back wall, the digging began. The plan called for a 30'x15' rebar and gunite pond ranging in depth from 2' to 4' and holding 11,000 gallons, plus the filter system. An island was created in the middle, with low walls dividing the pond into two sections, separately drainable for major maintenance. A large patio and deck were added to the house. Tons of boulders were carefully placed in the yard, but no real rock touches water in either pond or pool.

> The original sand filter lasted about a year, and was replaced by a 3-chamber up-flow filter above the pond and filter pit: 3/4" rock, pea-gravel, and silica sand polish the water after it goes through a UV light. By 2002, tree roots had cracked the blocks in a corner of the filter chambers about 18" below the water level, so a second filter system was added so the chamber could be repaired. The koi were isolated by the deck and the low walls were sandbagged, so Nick could bore a 4" hole in the bottom and a $2\frac{1}{2}$ " hole in the front side of the pond wall, and set up a gravity-flow filter system beside the garage, digging up the lawn in the process. When that was finished, he could repair the cracked filter walls. The venturi returns pump air from the secondary system.



pond! Day Two, Mamaduck walked them to the pool and back, and Day Three they disappeared. We figured they didn't like the lawn mower. Twelve ducklings the next year; same routine. But the third time, something got onto the island: Nick found egg shells in the pond...and a lone egg buried so deep in the nest it was missed. I still have it; Mamaduck was gone and it couldn't survive.

was asked what it was like 30 years ago. Well, \$179,000 bought a house surrounded by dirt – DG and clay – flat out to about where the spa is, then a 2:1 slope up 17' to the wall. Even with 72 trees planted, it was

full sun for the first few years; 10 to 15 years in, he had to replace all the sun-tolerant plants with shade lovers. It's usually 10-15 degrees cooler in the back yard than in the front. The Redwood hybrids we received aren't happy here, and many have been removed; two more will be cut this month....

had a short break for seconds on dessert and pit stops before Brenda Aker started the drawing, as the Fales were out of town. Always a fun way to end the day!

say it again: you missed a lot of valuable information if you missed this meeting, so I'll try to recap key points (see page 9). Next month we'll visit an exceptional home in Redlands. 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MARCH GUEST SPEAKER. . .

"Koi Jack" Chapman

DOES A 32" CHAMPION BELONG IN YOUR POND?

As *Jack Chapman*, one of our favorite guest speakers, struggled with the mic, he broke the ice with this quip: "*I know, you're all afraid of a voice malfunction. It ain't gonna happen*!"

From there, he presented quite a challenge: to sit down this time of year and make a serious review of where you are with your pond, then question your goals for the year along three lines of thought – KOI, FOOD, and ENVIRONMENT. He addressed each issue in 12-minute bursts of focused energy.

KOI: Do you want a new fish this year? You get to decide what to spend on koi, and the more you're willing to spend, the more you need to know about keeping koi. You can enjoy a new fish for a time and then trade it out at auction, but if you invest a small fortune, you're not going to let it go that easily. Do you have a koi 'bucket list'? A specific variety, size you dream of having? Weigh what it will take to get it, to keep it healthy for a long time. Do you want to show it? What will you have to do to maximize its potential, how long it will take, are you committed to that goal?

Jack had two on his list. ◆The first, a 2-year-old *Shiro Utsuri* from Japan that he bought and left in Japan to be grown out for one year in the ideal conditions in which it was bred and raised. He didn't enjoy it in his pond, but he did enjoy entering it in the All Japan Show as a 3-year-old and winning a second place trophy! ◆The second, a 2-year-old *Asagi* at a dealers-only auction, had a high price tag. He gamely asked if there was any chance of getting it for \$2500-\$3000, and the dealer sagely asked, "You want the front half or the back half?" It sold for \$7200.

FOOD: Nutrition is vital to the health of your fish, whatever you have and, again, *you get to decide what you feed your koi*—based on what you want your koi to become. Read the labels, but anything beyond that is "proprietary information" and not for us. In fish meals alone, there are 40-50 grades; white fish meal has 20 grades. Most people like to be told exactly what to feed and when.

Jack recommends that you measure a fish to get the real length – tip of nose to tip of tail – then calculate weight based on a koi weight chart. Weight is important for medications dosing and for calculating how much to feed based on how much growth you want. Use a weight-to-length chart, or employ the 12-12 rule: a typical 12-inch koi weighs 12 ounces. Obviously, a fat fish weighs more; a skinny fish, less. A formula for determining the weight of other-length koi is: weight = length x length x length / 144 (for weight in ounces). Then decide how much growth you want, 1 or 2 or 3%. Feeding schedules are different for small, medium and large fish, so its easier to go with the middle rate as the average if you have a great diversity of sizes. Then, measure out the food for each feeding; in summer, Jack feeds 7 times a day.

Jack is very fond of suggesting a "poop watch" as a practical diagnostic of koi health. After all, everything that goes incomes back out, and you can tell a lot from the poop: Are you feeding too much? Are they able to digest it all?

Want some special foods for your pets? Silkworm pupae are a great treat for koi, but rather expensive at \$80-85 for a box. The mulberry trees on which the silkworms feed are high in important amino acids, and koi need the same amino acids with only a couple of exceptions. A cheap and very satisfactory substitute is red yams. Bake the <u>unpeeled</u> yams in a 350-degree oven for 40 minutes, then slice and dice; don't make mush. The yams are especially good for red colored koi (and red should be the primary color in the pond), and can be fed to them from early Spring into late Fall. In Australia, koi keepers will beef up a fish by treating it with honey on wheat bread: simply spread the honey on the bread

and then bake it a bit to make a drier toast. Another favorite is powdered marigold flowers, but don't overdo it: your white koi may show up yellowish!

A few important notes: Don't store koi food in a plastic container in the full sun; keep it in the shade, or better yet, indoors. And don't buy or try to keep a 3-year supply of any food; take seriously the expiration dates, as seriously as on your own foods.

ENVIRONEMENT: As a hobbyist, *you get to decide how much you control your koi's home environment*. Maintenance schedule of the pond is vital to the health of your koi. You must be able to control the stress levels surrounding your koi: stress shortens their lives and destroys their colors. So what causes stress?

- •Spring transition is hard on our koi, especially with the temperature fluctuations we have. At 62-63°, a fish's immune system is functioning at about 50%; the immune system in the Fall is at its optimum. Therefore, do heavy maintenance then, when the fish are at their strongest. "The most important thing about Spring is how you put them to be in the Fall." (*That's another talk*.)
- ◆Ammonia there should be none.
- *pH and temperature changes, AM to PM. Koi are sensitive to change and will start flashing in the evening as a reaction to a 4° temperature change or a pH fluctuation of 0.4 up or down. <u>You</u> get to decide how much testing or journaling you do to track it.
- Chlorine is a killer; so are chloramines. Chloramines are a combination of ammonia with chlorine. Unlike straight chlorine, which dissipates fairly quickly when exposed to air, chloramines remain in the water and are not good for our fish.
- ◆Oxygen Koi waste half their energy in osmoregulation [i.e., maintaining fluid balance and the concentration of electrolytes (salts in solution) to keep the body fluids from becoming too diluted or too concentrated] instead of repair and growth. An increase in O₂ levels can be an incredible bonus; know your pond's O₂ level and increase it for denser populations.
- •Alkalinity Alkalinity is related to the amount of dissolved calcium, magnesium, and other compounds in the water and as such, alkalinity tends to be higher in "harder" water. (Hard water is noted for causing black *shimis* on koi.) In an established pond, the ideal alkalinity measurement should be around 100 ppm; readings from 50 to 200 are acceptable. High alkalinity is normally prevented by routine water changes. Watch the alkalinity to prevent a pH crash.

Reconsider Jack's challenge to do an annual review – to make the decisions regarding koi selection, food requirements, and environmental controls – and then enjoy your koi more! •



About the Crockpot Potatoes....

So here's the recipe from Larry & Debby Leverett

SLOW COOKER LOADED BAKED POTATOES

- •Cheesy potatoes have long been a favorite on holiday tables, and this slow-cooker recipe makes them especially easy to make. Layering baby red with salty bacon spicy jalapeño, green onions and parsley, then topping it off with rich sour cream, makes for an amazing side dish!
- ◆Prep, 20 min. Cook time, 6 hrs. Difficulty, easy. Serves 16 Ingredients:

4# baby red potatoes, halved

¹/₄ cup sliced green

onions

1 tsp minced garlic 1 T red jalapeño, minced

4 cups shredded cheddar

Fresh parsley leaves,

chopped

¹/₃ cups crumbled cooked bacon Sour cream

Directions:

- 1. Spray a 4- or 6-quart slow cooker insert with cooking spray.
- 2. Layer about one-third each of potatoes, garlic, cheese, bacon, onions and the jalapeño; repeat layering to use up all the ingredients. Cover, cook 3-4 hours on high, or 5-6 hours on low, until potatoes are fork tender.
- 3. Sprinkle potatoes with parsley and more sliced green onions. Serve with sour cream. Refrigerate any leftovers.


