The **April 14** Board meeting included the third Auction Planning Meeting. It was hosted by the Milfelds at 6PM, with dinner served at 5PM; the full Board attended, plus two guests.

- March 24 at Vicki Grunewald's in Cherry Valley: We had 41 members and guests. As the builder, Ed Brown talked about Vicki's pond then moved on to his Q&A followed. He had thoughtful ideas for adding a Japanese touch to the landscape. Ample food and a <u>clear day</u> with no rain!

- *Koi Rescue:* •QT pool for Auction is set up at the Kushners'. •A 3/26 rescue netted 24 koi and three hi-fin sharks; a 4/6 rescue netted one big koi. •There are about 40 koi in QT. •Deadline to <u>register to sell</u> fish at the auction is Wednesday, May 15. •Donating koi to the auction? Ed may be able to arrange to pick them up from you.
- Koi Auction ~ Saturday, June 1: •Besides rescued koi, members may bring fish to sell, with a limit of five per member, or donate them to the club. •All members must register by May 15 to sell or to give koi to the auction; do this at meetings or call the Kushners to let them know.
- *Norco HS Pond Project:* Students are still enthusiastic about project. They have dug for plumbing from the vortex to the pond, cutting out roots and all. Eric Triplett donated bottom drains, a Helix skimmer and the vortex, and will help them install the liner when they're ready. Eric and Deanna Fales are drawing blueprints for a project manual.
- *Tom's Farms Project:* Brenda Aker is coordinating with owner Sunny; they have a bid estimate of \$18,500 to fix the filtration system, including two 35,000-gallon *Ultima II* systems. The nitrite levels remain high.

HOST PROFILE: APRIL 28

Ed & Linda Kushner, Corona

Our club President and VP will host the April meeting at their Corona home. *Ed & Linda Kushner* purchased one of only four flag lots in their development in 2001; they were at-

tracted by its privacy, elevation, views, and the borrowed landscape afforded by its being bordered on two sides by the Cleveland National Forest. Building a pond with that backdrop seemed natural, like fencing off a riparian pool and building your home around it. The area is not truly forested...there are no trees in sight, just wide open space.



Their house sits high behind a neighbor that faces the street. The neatly-landscaped

long driveway leads to a wide drop-off area with space to turn around, but not enough space for parking. At present, a 15-foot diameter pool is set up at the top as a quarantine tank. We ask that you park <u>on the street</u>, but feel free to drop people or things off at the top and then move back to the street. Check out the pool, then come through the gate to meet around the pond.

The original pond, built by Kan-Do Ponds of Placentia, was featured on our 2008 Pond Tour. It was basically an *Aquascape* design full of rocks and lacking any bottom drains. Ed's learning curve ran the gamut of removing the rocks, adding bottom drains, protecting against local predators... and planning the remake that was finished in 2016, and showcased last year on our Pond Tour.

The Kushners joined IKS in 2004, admitting that they didn't know much when they began, but now Ed is one of our club "experts" and has managed our Rescue & Re-homing program for several years. His own 1400-gallon QT tank, located in the 'dead-end' behind the house, is used year-round for rescues, but, as auctions approach, he sets up an above-ground pool with full filtration to quarantine fish for months before the event. You may recognize the water bar (filtration return) is




very much like those in every tank at Inland Koi, which we visited last June.

What exactly did the Kushners do to their pond? For starters, they engaged *Ed Brown* of *Ponderiffic* to do the work. Visually, the original pond was like a stream and two divided sections, holding 5,000 gallons; the new pond is almost tripled in volume. Like two streams merging in a natural pond, 45' by 20' and 6' deep; the volume is now 14,000 gallons. A stone bridge was replaced with a lovely arched wooden bridge with a solar light on top of each post for night-lighting. The two separate sections appear larger, wider, and are obviously much deeper.

Filtration was a major change: more pond needs more! The original pond had one skimmer with dual submersible pumps that fed two vortexes and flowed into the waterfalls at opposite ends of the system; a UV light was a later addition, as were drains on the filters. Adding a solar system in 2006 saved about \$500 a WAY will be on your month in utilities, and continues to be a wise decision as the new left, up the long drive.

system includes two Savio skimmer filters with Sequence 8200 pumps (8200gph and 445 watts), drawing from the surface and separate bottom drains. There's a new AlphaOne LH 6.0 filter, rated at 17,000 gallons; it pulls from two bottom drains, with a 12,500 gph pump pulling from a Wave-36 Vortex and a ZappPur ZP-40 UV. There's a total of four 4" bottom drains with air diffusers, and two air pumps serving the bottom drains. Lots of water movement, lots of healthy stuff! And some pretty nice koi, too. [*Here's a clear picture of all of that — the schematic from the Tour booklet.*]





MARCH 24 MEETING NOTES

Hosted by Vicki Grunewald, Cherry Valley

Visiting *Vicki Grunewald* was a treat, despite the long drive to Cherry Valley, which 41 members and guests made. Even a local family the process of building a pond stopped in, having seen the signs on the street. Vicki's home is designed for entertaining, with covered patios and a bar area, small gardens, and a big kitchen island for setting up the buffet. Lunch was a great collection of dishes, from BBQ ribs by our hostess, to beans & rice and chili, with salads and lots of desserts.

Vicki joined IKS last September while her pond was being built by *Ed Brown*, her son-in-law. We've enjoyed chatting with Ed Brown of *Ponderiffic* the last few months. He was responsible for the redesign/rebuild of the Kushner's pond, and was our speaker this month. *Ponderiffic* is a landscape design and construction firm with an impressive list of projects to recommend it, including Disney's Epcot Center in Florida, wineries in Temecula, Descanso Gardens in La Canada, etc. Ed's personal credentials are impressive, too, with an MS in Plant Science; licensing or certifications as a landscape contractor, a crop advisor, a pest control advisor; plus experience in horticulture, wildlife biology, water gardening,

and mechanical contracting. He has created a new business, focusing on sustainable landscaping and backyard farming, to complement what *Ponderiffic* does.

Ed described building Vicki's 3000-gallon pond and taking advantage of the natural slope for a gentle waterfall. Unable to get an excavator through the garden gate, they hand dug the pond to a

3.5- to 4-foot depth....and found a huge boulder blocking their progress. They had to remove part of the side fence and come in through a vacant lot to get the excavator in after all. It is a liner pond with a 4-inch aerated bottom drain by Rhino. The power head is an external pump, a 1/2hp Performance Pro that pulls water through a UV; the two are the only pieces of the 4000gph system exposed upstream behind the low waterfall. As you walk by the rocky edge, you can see the many submerged plant containers; an exceptionally cold winter killed many of the plants; *Eric Triplett* brought Vicki a lot of replacements.

Much was taught in the exchanges of questions and answers as Ed talked about autofill, overflow, and other such devices....

How often should you turn the water over? The rule of thumb is <u>at least</u> every hour, and that's through the biofilter.

If you leave the filter off for 8 hours, will that create toxicity? The general rule is that after 12 hours the biological system starts to die and will turn toxic.

How often do you change *all* the water? Periodic *partial* water changes are recommended, partly to avoid water spikes of chlorine, although chloramine are more commonly used than chlorine today in





public water supplies. Out here, on a good windy weekend, we can lose an inch of water by evaporation. You can't keep the same water and just top off to replace evaporation; eventually you'll get a build-up of chemicals. It's recommended to replace 10% a week to keep water parameters balanced.

Why fill valves? To keep water level constant. There are many styles — Hudson, Tubular, Election, Levolar but a fill valve inside a skimmer is easy to install and to calibrate, it's protected....

At the end, a plea was made for every able-bodied member to volunteers to work the coming Auction. We were reminded to pre-register to sell koi, or to donate koi to the club to be sold, and also reminded that fish to be sold should not be fed for a couple of days prior to the event. We also need to know of used equipment that will be sold so we can provide enough display space for it. Questions about the event an be addressed to Nick or Larry.

Announcements and the raffle closed out the day, and all were wished a safe journey home.







TOP FIVE SPRING KOI DISEASES

I want to thank Larry Leverett for giving me a link to this Southern California veterinary group specializing in aquatic pets. What I especially like is that they are a (basically Southern) California group. Located in Watsonville (about 25 miles south of San Jose), The team of veterinarians do more than treat — they also teach, offering a monthly online and in-store seminar/webinar to educate responsible pet parents. TOP 5 SPRING DISEASES IN KOI

It's almost koi season at Aquatic Veterinary Services! Here are our most common diseases we can expect to see and the signs you should be aware of if any of these diseases are present in your pond.

5. Carp Pox

Although not THE *koi herpes virus*, carp pox is also known as *cyprinid herpesvirus-1*. It *causes lesions within the skin* that can look like "candlewax drippings" and "frosting" along the leading edges of the lips and fins. In cooler water temps, the lesions can be severe, but as the water warms, the fishes' immune system and skin replacement can make the lesions almost vanish. Only in severe cases will a fish start to be compromised to secondary infections.

Since this is a herpes virus, *there is no treatment or cure*. If you have one fish in your pond showing these clinical signs, all of

your fish have already been exposed. Only the immune-compromised or stressed individuals will show clinical signs.

This is a very common disease to diagnose. Unless the case is severe, the fish will have good health, but will not be very pretty.

4. Monogenean Treamatodes (aka 'flukes')

These irritating little worms are most commonly gyrodactylus or dactylogyrus species. They can infiltrate the skin or gills and cause severe irritation for any fish. You will most commonly see signs of skin irritation, with increased redness on paler fish, bruises or missing scales.

Since fish cannot itch themselves like a cat or dog, they exhibit a behavior known as "flashing." Usually, you will see your fish throw themselves sideways along the sides or bottom of their pond in an attempt to dislodge these irritable invaders.

Severe infestations can cause the gills to shut down and death to occur. There are many over-the-counter medications that will claim to take out these bugs. Please keep in mind that these medications are not controlled or overseen by any government checks. A veterinarian can prescribe a prescription-strength medication to take care of your problem safely and easily.



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3. Gondal Sarcomas

Unfortunately, we often do not catch these tumors in time for surgery. *Females between 8-12 years of age seem particularly more susceptible.* Our Spring Pond Package for 2019 will include ultrasound screenings for all females since we are trying to catch this disease early.

These space-occupying tumors most likely start from female gonadal tissue. The only physical sign you may see is a slightly enlarged, perhaps asymmetrical, body shape. By the time they are visible externally, most of the internal organs are failing. These masses are very hard to catch, which is why our new screening system will be started this year. If caught early, the tumor can be removed via surgery.



2. Trichodina

This aggressive "scrubbing bubble" is often aided by our #1 disease in koi. We tend to see this parasite most commonly, often displaying the same "flashing" behavior as our monogenean friends.

This parasite is easily treated by our prescription-strength medication. *Over-the-counter medications do not work well* against this parasite for some reason.



1. Water Quality

I know it is not a "disease," but *poor water quality is the #1 diagnosis for disease* I make. Having poor water quality makes all diseases WORSE, including bacteria, fungi, parasites and other pathogens.

Water quality is directly linked to fish health. Like the air we breathe, the water a fish swims in has a direct effect on their overall immune function. Before the spring diseases come, get your maintenance routine overhauled; *test your water chemistry regularly* to make sure your fish have their best chance for a healthy spring.

KOI & WATER QUALITY

Koi are the most common fish we see through our veterinary service. The majority of issues in koi **are secondary to poor water quality**. We understand that in drought prone areas, doing your regular water changes can be difficult. With limited maintenance, stress from **poor water quality often leads to secondary diseases involving bacteria, parasites and fungi**.

If you are having an issue with your koi, check your water quality FIRST. If your parameters are not within range, it is time for a water change. Always use a liquid-based test kit

that has been purchased within the last year. The expiration date is only for the store shelves.

Parameter	Range
Ammonia	= 0.1 mg/L</th
Nitrite	0 mg/L
Nitrate	<80 mg/L
pH	6.5-9.0
kH	>100 mg/L
gH	>100 mg/L
Temperature	Seasonal

If your parameters are within range, how many fish are affected? Is it just one fish or more than one? If only one fish is acting sick, move it to your quarantine system. If you do not have a QT system, you should get one set up or have one ready.

One of the most common issues we see is *gonadal sarcomas* in koi. These space-occupying tumors, most common in female koi, cause a prolonged pregnancy appearance. It is important that these tumors are caught early. If you have a fish that has looked like the #3 image for a long period of time, or has an asymmetrical belly, it needs to be screened ASAP. Screening is a painless process performed with ultrasound under anesthesia. \approx

Koi Rescue, March 26, 2019

Ed Kushner was asked to do a quick rescue for a pond owner who was leaving Friday, Mar. 29. *Tom Wright* and I visited the pond Monday morning the 25th, in Pedley; we would be back soon to take all the koi and



a few hi fin sharks.

Tom wanted to try out his newest purchase, a *flexible mobile tank* and an *air converter* that uses a vehicle's electricity to run an air stone, and use my Ford truck to haul the fish to Ed's quarantine pool in Corona.



Tom started making calls and added *Brenda Aker, Ed Broomfield* and *Larry Leverett*, plus Tom and I, to do the rescue on Tuesday at 10:30am. We took 24 koi and 3 hi fin sharks back to Corona at 1:30 pm.

The flexible tank turned out to be very practical and a time-saver: we didn't have to bag each fish individually nor carry an oxygen tank to the site.

The pond owner (in the



bright red hoody) didn't want any water removed, so it took much longer to catch the last two fish: they were mostly black and we couldn't see them, especially once we started dragging the nets along the bottom to chase them up. We had to leave the pond running as is, but no fish. ~Deanna Fales



This flexible transport tank fit neatly in the pick-up's bed. The fish inside have treated and aerated water, and the whole thing takes up less room — and time — than 27 bags in boxes. Ask Tom for more info on source and pricing.



We've found that written questions are a practical format for our Panel Discussion programs, and several have noted that conversations over lunch frequently focus on issues one member asks another about. The questions are often common to several people, and the answers would be profitable to all.
