APRIL GENERAL MEETING

Hosted by Ed & Linda Kushner, Corona

propos to the coming Auction, we met at *Ed & Linda Kushner's* lovely home in Corona for our April 17 meeting (scheduled a week early to free everyone to celebrate Easter.) For the last several months, Ed has maintained a 15-foot diameter aboveground pool as a quarantine tank for koi taken from several members' ponds that had to be closed down.

If nless you've participated in one of our Koi Auctions, you don't realize how much work goes into it in the months preceding the actual event. Both the Kushners and **Tom & Zuma Ross** kept a pool-size quarantine tank, effectively doubling their water, pond power and koi food bills for six months, expenses which the club partially subsidized.

Iose to a hundred koi populated those two pools, painstakingly collected from various members' ponds or rescued from other sites. In October, the rescue team traveled out to Hesperia to remove and relocate about 60 koi from **Dolores Woernel's** pond, bringing them home in bags to the two Q-pools. The team went to **Bob Everett's** Riverside pond (Bob was the founder of AKCA and the Inland Koi Society) to help Marguerite close it down; all his beautiful big koi were donated to the auction. And in the week before the auction, the team went to Claremont to close **Lori McCarthy's** lovely 'Monet' pond, adding her collection to the rest.

The 'rescue team' is generally led by *Ed Kushner* and *Gene Maingot*, and has included *Orville Hanson*, *Bob Henry*, *Mark Krakower*, *Rey Quirong*, *Dennis Lynaugh*, *Tom Ross*, *Tom Wright*, and others. *Sandy Hanson* has gone along as photographer, and other wives have gone, too, to stand watch with a pond's owner as the team undoes years of a husband's work.

It is a long day of back-breaking work, and once everything is loaded into trucks and taken home, it all has to be unloaded and the fish floated and then released. But our guys are there to help when help is needed, and all deserve huge thanks. Without them, we wouldn't have an auction!

kay, enough about that. More important stuff was going on at the meeting besides checking out the fish. While the attendance was down a bit to 42, the food supply was up to par and delicious. Most everyone set up in the driveway facing the Q-tank [it's a long uphill driveway, screened from street traffic] and they seemed to take advantage of the lovely day to relax, chat and catch up with each other. That kind of fellowship is part of the charm of our club! Soon enough, though, we moved to the back yard around Ed's pond to listen to his discussion of it.

ever is a pond truly finished, it seems: there are always some adjustments to be made here or there. Ed's pond followed suit, changing with his growing experience. He has learned the hard way that you can make changes over time to improve your pond system, reach-

ing for that elusive state of perfection. He has removed rocks from the bottom, installed two vortexes, and will soon replace two submersible pumps with external pumps; he realized how much more expensive to run the submersibles have been. Besides the club's 4,000-gallon quarantine pool occupying the top of his driveway—with 35-40 big koi in it—Ed maintains his own 1,400gallon Q-tank with a Nexus filter.



Refreshingly clear water in the pond led some to question how Ed keeps the algae at bay, since everyone else seem to be struggling with the string algae so common in the spring. Ed wages a four-pronged attack on algae, employing an 80-watt UV, lots of aeration, a great turnover rate, and shade.

ragging everyone up to the guarantine pool, and deferring to those who would be trying to capture koi to sell at the auction, Tom Wright demonstrated the "Wright Way" to net koi, and how to handle a netted koi. He used guite a big entry level net because of the awesome size of the fish Ed is keeping, but he prefers a sock net. This incredible net is designed for handling especially large koi without causing them injury. The net is secured to a probably-15" diameter frame; the 'sock' is open-ended and probably 48" long. To take a fish, the handler clasps the open end of the sock in one hand and the handle in the other; he scoops the koi into the net face first, and moves it to a new location, supporting it in what looks like a sling between his two hands. With the net lowered into the water, the bottom of the net is released and the net is lifted free as the koi slides through and swims free. It is definitely a koi-friendly way to move big fish! Tom let several people try their hands at the maneuver and convinced us all that the sock net is an indispensable accessory to have.

early AKCA business was addressed by *Larry Leverett*, AKCA Rep. He presented the ballot for new AKCA officers, passing on the IKS Board of Directors' recommendation to cast write-in votes for *Leverett* and *Mike Frady* as AKCA Chairman and Vice Chairman, respectively, and to vote for the other nominees as listed. The club vote was unanimous for the candidates as recommended by the Board. Auction Chairman *Nick Milfeld* announced that all volunteers should wear their 2010 Pond Tour shirts for the auction; those without shirts would be given one that moming. Posters and flyers were sent home with everyone to promote the event. *Mary Leever* and *Ed* called the raffle as everyone gathered around the back pond again. And with no general meeting in May, Dennis adjourned the meeting with a jaunty, "See you all at 8:00 AM on Auction Day!"

Koi Person of the Year is an honor given in recognition of someone who has made a significant contribution to koi keeping or to their club during the past year. We are pleased to honor Bob Henry for 2011.

When you elected Bob Henry in 2009, you gave the IKS Board of Directors the type of person every board wants: an active member, a willing worker, and a visionary with novel ideas for adding new benefits to IKS membership.

Bob, wife Bonnie, and daughter Erica, joined the club in June 2008, following a Pond Tour. They embraced the club and immediately became active participants in whatever was planned. Bob has been a strong arm whenever one was needed, especially in helping with koi rescues and the closing down of various members' ponds. He was there for Dolores Woernel in Hesperia, for Marguerite Everett in Riverside, and for Lori McCarthy in Claremont. He is there to help unload cars at meeting sites, and to muscle up the EZ-Ups when we use them. He's friendly, helpful, and outgoing.

The first challenge Bob presented to the Board was a simple question: *Does the IKS provide any scholarship funds for member students?* At the time we didn't; not that we had chosen not to, but the idea hadn't come up before. We considered it, explored the process, and gave it to a committee to write an appropriate application. And we decided that \$500 would at least help a college student with the cost of textbooks. When the word went out, the most qualified applicant was Erika Henry, to whom we proudly awarded the first IKS Scholarship. We look forward to knowing who will receive the second award this year.

Bob also challenged us to establish an IKS **Blood Donor Community**. He researched the process, and when given the go-ahead, set it up for us. He almost single-handedly supplies the required annual minimum donations.* We hope more and more members will choose to participate in this endeavor which, regardless of personal donations made, will supply blood products to any active member at no charge if their insurance will not cover it. What a blessing, what assurance, just for belonging to IKS!

Bob has been a donor for a long time now, but on *Friday, May 13, he will join the "40-Gallon Club"* and celebrate with his blood-giving buddies at the San Bernardino Donor Center. 
