

AROUND THE OVAL POND

The IKS Board meets monthly, generally on the Wednesday evening following the Sunday regular meeting of the club. The meeting begins at 7:00pm and is open to any interested members.

The September 28 meeting was held at the Fales home in Corona, and Deanna served dinner. We discussed:

- A good turnout on Sept. 25 at the Nyirady's with 44. Speaker Eric Triplett was a character, and absolutely passionate about his work. Especially with the *Helix skimmer*, which he generously donated to the raffle. Didn't get a talk about Steve's new *ProfiDrum Combi-Bio* as it wasn't up and running yet.
- *Confirmed* plans for October 23, with Spike Cover speaking on winterizing the pond, and November 20 at the Malls in Temecula, with sign-ups for the Thanksgiving Feast in October. Elections in November, dark in December. Malls travelling in Africa and missed Sept./Oct. meetings.

Eric Fales can pick up the pool, filter, pump and pipes from IKS storage. We will limit the auction to about 100 koi, with a limit of 5 coming from any one member's pond. Event take lots of volunteers!

OCTOBER HOST PROFILE

George & Juli Ramirez, Claremont

We will retwrn this month to our 2:00 to 5:00 pm meeting time and make a first-time visit to the ponds of *George & Juli Ramirez* in Claremont. They joined us just a year ago when we met at the Marrins', and immediately committed themselves to active participation in the club. They were interested even then in hosting a meeting, but had a lot more land—and hardscaping they wanted to finish; in fact, when we visited, they were finishing an expanded flagstone patio area, a fire pit, and a sitting wall across the back—casual seating and more room for our chairs!

George & Juli have been married 15 years, moving here October 7, 2006 (a memorable way to celebrate George's birthday) from Montebello — certainly not getting closer to work! George ride-shares to L.A. where he is the maintenance mechanic for the LA County Waste Management, working night hours and getting home about 2AM. Juli, on the other hand, leaves about 7AM with son Michael, who works in pest control and is studying for state testing. A legal secretary for 20 years, Juli takes the commuter train for a 1½-hour trip to an LA law firm. She is also a part-time student at Mt. San Antonio College, proactively studying for her paralegal certificate to make herself more valuable to the firm ('secretary' positions are disappearing); she's also a notary and real estate signing agent. David, a younger son, studied culinary arts at Mt. SAC and works at Petrillo's in San Gabriel. With all the varied schedules, I think Martha, the boys' grandmother, is the one constant at the house, keeping Cooper, a friendly four-year-old pup, company.

Once settled in, the projects began, starting with a new driveway, front walk, and bigger patio. Although we will enter by the driveway, you'll want to walk to the front door and peek behind the lemon tree or you'll miss the first pond. In 2011, George was ready to try his hand at building a pond; visually hidden from the street, its soothing sounds are enjoyed in the front bedrooms. This gem is a 900-gallon liner pond, 18" deep (per city regulations) with a Skippy filter* made from egg crates, PVC pipe and filter pads; George cleans it once a year. Behind the Skippy is a matala filter, detachable for use as a QT tank. The pond is home to goldfish, notably a 7-year-old carnival fish won by one of the boys and those 10-for-a-dollar kind that raccoons find so tasty. Yes, they used to lose about seven fish a year to the bandits; in fact, one morning about 4:30, five raccoons were seen walking away with their breakfasts! But they haven't seen any of the critters in the last four years.

With the hardscape done, the next job was to remove all the lawn in the backyard, level the ground, and bring in Eric Triplett to get his vision of the pond possibilities. The resulting 2600-gallon liner pond was finished in 2013. It is 26" deep, has no bottom drain, and utilizes one of the Helix biomechanical skimmer filters in the left end (hidden under a stepping stone). There's also an up-flow filter with 200 pounds of volcanic rock and a 1/2hp pump that feeds the two

waterfalls. George give the pond a monthly dose of Microbe-Lift Sludge Away to accelerate the biological digestion of organic solids in the rock-bottom design.

Conce the pand was finished, Eric's wife — the plant person — came to recommend plant selections for around it. There are conflicting schools of thought regarding plants <u>in</u> the pond, but plants <u>around</u> the pond are usually the finishing touch that takes the pond



to the next level. Here are tall elephant ears fronted by rosemary, mint and sage; papyrus and umbrella plants, cut-leaf philodendron, iris and variegated grasses. If anyone is interested in adding elephant ears to their gardens, there are starts, available: simply give the Ramirez's a call and they will have them ready for you at the meeting. Just be warned: George trims his back every two weeks; they're that happy where they're planted!

The latest project was nearing comple-

tion when we visited. An expanded flagstone patio was being laid around a new fire pit, with a low sitting wall in the background. This will mean more room for all of our chairs and, if the hot

weather returns, space for EZ-ups. The house opens onto a large covered patio where food service will be set up, and I will warn all in advance to watch your feet: there is one step-down the full width of the patio, and we don't want any falls (self included!)



Our speaker this month will be

Spike Cover with a couple of topics. Spike had a whole professional life (engineering, aerospace, biomedical...) before koi, but started in *fish* when he was just three. He headed AKCA's Scientific Committee for 10 years; founded, planned and staffed AKCA's KHA (Koi Health Advisor) training program, writing and teaching many of the courses including anatomy, physiology, KHV and labs; Directed AKCA's Project KHV (Koi Herpes Virus), identifying and vetting research projects. In 2009, he co-founded K.O.I., Inc.,** an

internet-based teaching and learning organization serving the world-wide koi hobby. He is an unstoppable writer and instructor and "incurable fish geek." He and wife Ginger are members of sever koi clubs, including ours. Spike will remind us of the steps we should take in the Fall to prepare our ponds and koi for Winter; he will also talk about K.O.I.. Bring questions!



And bring your chairs and your favorite potluck dish, and come prepared to relax for another afternoon of koi learning. Consider your level of involvement and whether you can up it a notch in the coming year. We'd love to have some new faces and fresh ideas on the Board!


Welcome to Our Newest Members

SEPTEMBER 25 MEETING NOTES

Entering Laura & Steve's Nyirady's backyard was like walking into Disneyland. The fairytale mother-in law's house and everything all so well-maintained, as if everything has been freshly painted overnight! At the same time, the grouped plantings of birches and other mature trees look so natural. You ask yourself, are these Laura and Steve's planting designs, or is this yet another phenomenon of nature itself? The sound of the breeze rustling through the leaves, kissing your face and wisping your hair – was a treat! Color was everywhere, with dahlias and potted ivy geraniums poking their heads into every conversation!

An example of the care Laura and Steve give, even to the tiniest detail, is their gorgeous indoor aquarium. Every planting is green and healthy, colored with bright fish who look content. However, some months ago Laura noticed their aquarium plantings looked unhealthy and were covered with a film. After some internet research, they suspected a possible bacterial infection. Erythromycin was the recommended treatment. It worked! Today, the Fales family and others sat with Laura on the living room floor, mesmerized by the beauty of the aquarium and Laura's story.

Their care extends to us as well! I'm sure we've all benefited by their gifts of shared advice, concern and practical wisdom. Their care also extends far beyond their own home, gardens and club – they've helped maintain the Edward-Dean Museum pond for years and have recently returned from a teaching mission in Thailand. Family is paramount, and family group portraits hang royally over their fireplace. A smile on her mother's face in one of the photos struck me immediately; Laura has wonderful stories about all of them, especially her dear mother! Noticeably, all décor has an Asian influence. Why not? Laura was born in China and raised in Taiwan.

The potluck opened with three tables set on the terrace, one in the shade for cool dishes, one in a sunny spot of the hot dishes, and one under the birches for the desserts! A vegetable curry with half-andhalf brown and white rice was prepared by the Nyirady's daughter-in -law; mini-hot dogs in buns were brought by Aiko; and there was pecan pie, to name a few buffet items! Eric Triplett loved the lunch, especially the "squash lasagna."

Rob opened the meeting with one of his carefully selected jokes, this month about a sea captain... Then he introduced Laura & Steve to the members. Steve explained they had just returned from a month-long trip to Thailand. On their return, their luggage was lost in Shanghai; they

their travels, a Thai Turtle.


In his pond talk, Steve shared that one of his big struggles has been algae...green slimy stuff, even admitting, with a smile, to using AlgaeFix: "One cup of AlgaeFix works in a bind." He ordered and has received the ProfiDrum CombiBio, an "all-in-one" mechanical filtration unit, made in Holland. Each ProfiDrum CombiBio model comes with an

integrated high-pressure pump to ensure the proper cleaning of the

drum screen: it has an air pump for the moving bed. You simply install the control box, connect your plumbing, and you are up and running. Steve hoped to have it installed by the meeting; it's set in place, but it still needs to be "tweaked and balanced." He offered to show it to anyone who was interested. He went on to describe his smaller pond, cautioning members never to run hose water into your pond without a timer! He has lost koi during this process of refilling with fresh water. Another warning concerns a UV bulb: With a new bulb end of June, last week he had a green pond. Laura said to check the UV light and, when he did, it wasn't working. Experience has led them to believe that a UV bulb's shelf life is not as long as advertised. (This one lasted 2000 hours – three months!) If you have a green pond, check your UV. Steve answered several good questions from the members.

Rob introduced our speaker, Eric Triplett, one of the nation's leading pond installers, who has perfected one of the most interesting



By 2006, Eric had built 600 ponds and seen many skimmers. He dissected and studied all the skimmers he had used, documenting the specifications. In 2011, he listed the pros and cons of all the skimmers he had studied and installed. The resulting skimmer is a round-body skimmer with a large, 12inch, water-level opening on top instead of a weir door. This skimmer becomes an exten-

sion of the pond itself, with fish able to swim safely in and out of it. According to Eric, "The Helix Pond Skimmer utilizes a floatingbasket skimmer which is safely mounted in a large, open-face skimmer." The Helix name was inspired by his view of the roads on Mount Helix in San Diego County and the pattern of water over the floating catch basket.

'Not only is this skimmer fish-friendly," Eric said, "but it holds a huge amount of leaves and debris due to the helix flow pattern that stacks leaves against the walls of the debris basket." With tens of millions of pools utilizing this same type of floating skimmer, the system has decades of success behind it. As The Pond Digger put it: "This is not the first floating skimmer – but it is the first externally mounted, fish-safe, high-capacity, high-flow skimmer available and it's made right here in the USA!" At this time, Eric offers these made -by-contractors-for-contractors skimmers to other installers through The Pond Digger Company (theponddigger.com). There were many questions for Eric that were well received and answered.

With much delight and buzzing among the members, Rob conducted the Raffle: the excitement stemmed from Eric's donation of his skimmer to the raffle, and Rob wanted it. Restraining himself and refusing to draw the numbers, Nick did the deed; Eric Fales won it! Rob sincerely invited members to attend the directors' meeting this Wednesday, August 31, at his home. Everyone was invited!! **Thank you,** Laura & Steve – we CARE about you!

Japanese Garden at Washington Park, Portland Oregon

These koi are trained to respond to different 'warnings' from their keepers: three solid raps of a wood pole on the deck alerts them to predators nearby and they go to hiding places or to the deepest side of the pond, another set of raps calls them to feeding. The enormous pond is monitored 24/7, and there is a local "koi lady" who visits monthly to inspect each fish and to treat any problems. A QT tank is maintained behind the scenes. We believe she is from one of the area koi clubs, but we couldn't get her name nor get contact back from the clubs, and so missed attending a meeting while there.





The pond flows throughout the garden and is complemented by a separate stream system without koi. An exquisite work, and in the process of being expanded.



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Most of the year we have no problems checking on our koi. As long as our water is clear, we can do visual checks at any time. We know if they are feeding, we can see unhealthy skin and takes steps to diagnose and correct problems. But as cold weather sets in and we stop feeding, we also tend to stop visiting them daily. As their activity levels slow and they sink to the bottom warmer reaches of the pond, we may see them lined up side by side, as if they can all fit in the warm spot best that way. We may wonder how they're doing...what they're doing.

Actually, they're not doing much. Their lack of activity is based on their being cold-blooded (poikilothermic is the big word) meaning their body temperature is controlled by their environment, i.e., the temperature of their home. Their body functions slow down in response to changes in water temperature, so much so that they don't feed during cold periods. They have reached a state of torpor. It is not fully hibernation, because their inactivity is generally briefer than true hibernation, but the parallels may be drawn between the two: metabolism has slowed, as have reaction times; breathing rate is reduced as are the primary body functions; they are saving energy that would be needed for greater activity.

Some koi keepers suggest that the fish will benefit from a cold period, yet prolonged cold spells are <u>not</u> beneficial, for there is a risk that their immune systems will fully shut down, leaving them defenseless. This is generally NOT an issue in our Southern California location, but certainly one for those whose ponds suffer long winters under ice and snow. There they must also deal with noxious gases, like ammonia, being trapped under the ice, and therefore must keep an opening in the ice.

A maximum low water temperature is 34°F; below that, ice crystals can form on the gills and kill the koi. Such a temperature may be possible in our mountain areas where snow is common in Winter, but not for most of us. There are those who add salt to their ponds, but they should be extra careful with in cold months. Salt can make your water's freezing point drop to below 30°F, which will kill the fish. If salt has to be used for a health treatment in cold weather, the salt levels should be diluted in Winter months.

Properly prepared, our ponds and our fish should weather Winter with ease and Spring will bring our koi out of their torpor. On Sunday, Spike will give us good guidelines for preparing our koi for their long Winter rest.

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The Meanings of Koi in China

Koi were developed from common carp in ancient China and were later transferred to Korea and Japan.

Carp were considered a *symbol of strength*. Koi are constantly swimming upstream and against the current; because of this, their image is used to represent *strength*, *independence*, *perseverance*, *ambition* and *good luck*.

The fish is symbolically employed as the *emblem of wealth* or *abundance* because of the similarity in the pronunciation of the words *fish* and *superfluity*, and also because fish are extremely plentiful in Chinese waters.

Owing to its reproductive powers, it's a *symbol of regeneration*. Additionally, as it is happy in its own element or sphere, it has come to be the *emblem of harmony* and *connubial bliss*. As fish are reputed to swim in pairs, so a pair of fish is *emblematic of the joys of union*, especially of a sexual nature.

It is also one of the *charms to avert evil*, and is included among the auspicious signs on the Footprints of Buddha. "The fish *signifies freedom from all restraint*. As in the water a fish moves easily in any direction, so in the Buddha-state the fully-emancipated knows no restraints or obstruction."

The carp, with its scaly armor, which is regarded as a *symbol of martial attributes*, is admired because it struggles against the current, and has therefore become the *emblem of perseverance*.

The Meanings of Koi in Japan

Koi Fish in Japan mean *good fortune* or *luck*. They also are associated with *perseverance in adversity* and *strength of purpose*. The Koi symbolizes good luck, *abundance* and *persever-*

ance. They are symbolic in Buddhism is to represent courage. Today the fish are considered symbolic of advancement materially and spiritually.

According to Japanese legend, if a koi fish succeeded in climbing the falls at a point called Dragon Gate on the Yellow River, it would be transformed into a dragon. Based on that legend, it became a *symbol of worldly aspiration* and *advancement*.

Recipe Request from September

Our speaker commented on the "Squash Lasagna" on the potluck table, and a few others asked about the recipe. Here is the original recipe, with notes on the variation served.

Yellow or Zucchini Squash Pie ~ (with GF option) Servings: 6-8 ~ Yield: one 10-inch pie [double for a 9 x 13 pan]

Ingredients:

4 C zucchini (or a mix of squashes) in thin slices

1 medium onion, chopped

 $\frac{1}{2}$ -1 C butter

1 tsp oregano

1 tsp basil

salt and pepper

2 eggs, beaten

2 C mozzarella cheese, shredded

1 (8 ounce) package crescent rolls

1 Tbsp Dijon mustard

Diced red, yellow and or green bell peppers


*[For a Gluten Free crust, use fine-crushed tortilla chips or Fritos; spread evenly in bottom of prepared pan and drizzle with a little melted butter or sprinkle with some shredded cheese to hold it together as it bakes.]

Directions:

- 1. Melt butter in skillet. Add squash, onions, salt and pepper, and spices. Cook until tender, about 5 minutes.
- 2. In a small bowl mix together the eggs and the cheese; add to the squash mixture and cook, stirring, to begin setting the eggs.
- 3. Meanwhile, line one 10-inch pie pan or a square pan with the rolled out crescent rolls. Spread 1 tablespoon of Dijon mustard on the crust. Pour the squash mixture into the pan.
- 4. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.
- •Since I rarely follow a recipe exactly each time, this can have many variations, but it is usually made gluten free with the chips; I do not use the mustard on the chips, but will add it to the eggs.
- •I usually use a quiche pan; with the 9x13 pan, all was doubled.
- •A combination of green and yellow zucchini, yellow crook-neck, Mexican squash, whatever is available, adds more flavor to the mix.
- •Any kind of shredded cheese(s) may be used; one of my favorites is white cheddar with horseradish. Goat cheeses, even bleu cheese, add great flavor.
- •For a little heavier option, leftover (planned-over) steak may be added, or bacon or ham. Add a big green salad and dinner or brunch is ready! Great reheated, too.
