

#### WINTER FEEDING . . .

## The Importance of Feeding During Winter

There are many myths about Koi Nutrition, so here are some scientific facts behind K.O.I.'s feeding recommendations. Let's look at the myth that koi should not be fed when water temperatures are below 50 degrees F.

Koi have evolved over millions of years to need a period of fasting, and even the top Japanese breeders who want to maximize growth are fasting their koi for at least a month over the winter. Duration of the fast varies, depending on with whom you talk, but all seem to agree that 1 to 3 months is ideal.

Remember that koi are Poikilothermic (or cold-blooded), which means that their body temperature is completely controlled by their environment. So their metabolism is slower when the water is cold, and faster when the water is warmer.

Koi also live in an oxygen-poor environment. Air holds 21% oxygen, while water holds only 0.0009% at 70 degrees F. Koi have no stomach, just a long gut. These facts influence the ability to digest food. And finally, koi need more protein in their diet than most mammals. Humans require 10-15% protein, dogs require 15-27%, cats require 30%, catfish require 32%, but carp require 35%! (*R. Strange, 2006*).

In one study, koi were offered a variety of protein feeds at different water temperatures, and they never selected low protein food, even in the coldest water. Koi have evolved to prefer high protein food at all water temperatures.

Plant based foods such as wheat germ should not be included in the koi diet, ever.

Koi food produced from plant sources contains some protein, but not enough of the essential amino acids required by koi. Plant based foods such as wheat germ should not be included in the koi diet, ever. Fish meal – specifically from high quality Capelin, Anchovy, Herring and Menhaden should be the first ingredient of koi food. Fish Meal

is different from White Fish Meal, which is a byproduct, and has a higher ash content and lower protein content, making it less digestible by carp. White Fish Meal also increases waste in the pond.

Based on the above scientific evidence, K.O.I. recommends that koi be fed the same, high-protein feed year round, and only the quantity should be changed depending on water temperature. Koi food does not rot in the koi's gut at low water temperatures – koi will simply not eat what they can't digest, but uneaten food will foul the water unless quickly removed.

Feeding in cold water should only be done
in extremely low quantities
— one to two pellets each —
and never more often than once a week.

Thus it is ideal to offer our koi one or two (really – one or two!) pellets each, if and only if they are swimming near the surface, and are actively looking to feed, when water temperatures are below 50 degrees. Feeding in cold water should only be done in extremely low quantities (one to two pellets each, remember?), and never more often than once a week. This does not disturb their fast, but will substantially improve their health as they are coming out of winter, and has been shown to help them start eating earlier in the spring.

week's worth of meals in advance. She had pans of




mac'n'cheese, ribs, cole slaw, platters of cookies, and a waffle bar with several toppings.

the stables. Cricket sat on the patio wall as she explained the little pond they have and the dream they want to build, which became a great interactive open-mike discussion of pond design as she sought ad-



vice from the club members. Ideas and good advice flowed freely, but finally it was suggested she invite a core group of our "experts" to a serious work session, having them review and fine-tune what plans they've drawn up.

[It struck me as a fun meeting idea, to put up a big drawing of a pond design, maybe with printed copies for everyone, and lead a troubleshooting session to see how many flaws and improvements the members could identify.]

Our guest speaker took the same seat to talk about 'Pond Automation." One of our newest members, *Paul Palacios* (joined 2/2022) has been a pool contractor for 30 years. He has been looking at all the new technology being used in pool design and wanted to integrate it into pond design. Today, when you can control your "smart house" from your mobile phone, it doesn't seem too much of a stretch to have a single system to control all and monitor a pond, too. A few of the innovative points he made included:

- Variable speed pumps are common, but now vari-flow pumps can communicate seamlessly with a phone. Dial in your flow rate and the system will maintain it, even when the filters need attention, by ramping up the flow rate. The system could maintain a set turnover rate.
- Remotely monitoring water temperature so that, when it reaches a set temp, a waterfall increases its flow for more aeration.
- Put your zip code into a program to monitor sunrise or sunset to schedule lighting.

After his talk, Paul shared more with a small group as members had more dessert,



explored further, and waited for the raffle. Looking forward to seeing even more of you at next month's meeting!

For the October newsletter —and for the September issue as well — I did a lot of reading on the subject to gain my own understanding of the Anoxic Filtration system. For the follow-up article in this month's issue, which I hope you find interesting and helpful, I failed to name my source(s). That error I would like to remedy here.

The article is a condensation of an article that appeared in *Pond Trade Magazine* (https://www.pondtrade-mag.com/anoxic-filtration-is-it-a-bog-filter-part-1/) in May 2011, with definitions and other insight garnered from questions that I "Googled" and from numerous other websites. There was also an introduction to and discussion with Kevin Novak Ph.D., the designer of the Anoxic Filtration System, on Koiphen.com in January 2007, which I found most interesting, especially since this system has been around since then, yet most of us have never heard of it before. Anyway,....

What I have learned since, and been thoroughly reprimanded for omitting, through ignorance, is that the **original article was authored by and should have been credited to Syd Mitchell of K.O.I.** My humble apologies to Mr. Mitchell; it was a fascinating article very clearly explaining a complex subject.

If anyone would like to learn more about Anoxic Filtration, K.O.I. offers a course on it, taught by Syd Mitchell; all info about the course can be found on the K.O.I. website, koiorganisationinternational.org/courses. There are many other courses listed there to help you become a better and more successful koi keeper.

## IKS ELECTIONS 2022 IS IT YOUR TURN??



**Elections** will take place at this meeting to fill the **2023 term**. I'd like to share a few caveats from the club Bylaws regarding the offices....

*First*, know that members who are owners of koirelated businesses cannot serve as officers. This is primarily breeders, builders or retailers, but we don't object to pond maintenance. The 'pond guy' is okay;)

**Second**, **Prez** and **VP** are elected to a 1-year term, but can serve a second. **Secretary**, **Treasurer** and **Editor** serve 2-year terms, but can extend three times. [*That's a total of eight years, and some of us have extended well beyond the limits because no one is willing to take the job.]* 

**Third**, seven **Directors** are elected for 2-year terms, with a max of four consecutive terms. [That's another total of eight years, and many of our Directors are maxed out.]

Fourth, a brief review of duties: The Prez presides at all meetings, with VP taking over in his/her absence. VP acts as Program Chairman, confirming hosts and speakers, with help from the rest of the Board and with the Members' input. Secretary takes minutes at the meetings. Treasurer keeps the checkbook and gives a monthly written report to the Board; also works with Prez to make sure new member packets include Bylaws and membership Directory. [If you never received a packet, let them know.] Editor sends out notices of meetings, i.e., the newsletter, but does NOT have to keep the current format. [But such notices cannot be only by email because not all members have email.]

**Taking an office** means adding a two-hour Board meeting with dinner on a Sunday night to your schedule, taking your turn hosting the meeting as possible. You'll note that several couples work together on the Board, sharing their common interest and making it a monthly night out with good koi friends! It's a small commitment to keep a great club going.



## Testing for good water quality is a year-round necessity

- Check for pH changes due to acid rain or snow
  - Add baking soda to mediate
- Check ammonia all winter, and continue to do water changes!
  - Koi produce ammonia year round
  - Filter bacteria are not active
  - Use Ultimate or Chloram-X when needed
- Feed one or two pellets only when Koi are at surface and actively seeking food
  - No more than once a week
  - Watch for ammonia spike after feeding
  - Koi that eat a tiny bit all winter are healthier going into spring!
